This report contains submissions received at Council as at 12 noon on Thursday 6 June 2019. Submissions received after this time are not included in this report. They will however be collated and presented to Councillors and the Special Council meeting that is to be held at 6:30pm on Tuesday 11 June 2019.

Purpose of Report

The purpose of this report is to consider the submissions received in relation to the Proposed 2019/20 Draft Budget.

Disclosure of Officer / Contractor Direct or Indirect Interest

No Council officer/s and/or Contractor/s who have provided advice in relation to this report have declared a Conflict of Interest regarding the matter under consideration.

OFFICER RECOMMENDATION

That Council notes that 17 formal submissions were received on the 2019/20 Budget for consideration prior to the adoption of the Budget and the declaration of rates and charges at a Council meeting to be held on 24 June 2019.

1. Executive Summary

In accordance with Sections 127 and 158 of the Local Government Act, Council advertised that its draft Budget was available for inspection and invited written submissions on any proposal contained in the draft Budget on Wednesday 9 May 2019. Section 127 requires that the Budget must be on display for at least 28 days and that Council consider any submissions received from interested parties pursuant to Section 223 of the Local Government Act.

The period for submissions relating to the 2019/20 Budget and Statutory Disclosures closed at 5.00pm on Thursday 6 June 2019 with formal adoption scheduled for a Council meeting at 7.00pm on 24 June 2019.

Any additional submissions will be brought to the attention of Council as they are received and tabled at the Special Council Meeting on 11 June 2019.

2. Consultation Process

A public Information Session was held on Wednesday 15 May 2019 which was widely advertised with invitations emailed to Council's Advisory Committees, Access and Equity Committee, business networks, and local sports clubs. 35 community members and two Councillors attended the session.

The following questions were raised and addressed by the CEO as far as possible at the Public Information Session, with officers responding to individual attendees.

- 1. Given the waste management issues (particularly in relation to recycling) is there a risk to waste disposal in Kingston and related costs?
- 2. What are the total costs for the Bay Trail and given the extent of the costs associated, is it value for money?
- 3. What can the community do to influence a Council decision, noting that 66% of Council revenue is from residents?
- 4. Does the Bay Trail budget have a fund for public consultation?
- 5. Can the Council demonstrate the value for money in relation to the purchase and refurbishment of the Masonic Hall?
- 6. Mentone upgrades have taken too long and impacted residents and traders. Does this demonstrate good value for money?
- 7. What was the rationale for the purchase of properties?
- 8. Can Council help with providing in home care for a resident recently home from surgery?
- 9. When will the Mordialloc Tennis Club have its courts replaced?
- 10. What is the role of Council Officers in influencing the Councillors decisions?
- 11. Can safety audits be undertaken to identify and resolve road changes?
- 12. While the ten-year financial outlook looks good, does it take into account the rates and property price down turns?
- 13. Why are properties with reduced values paying more for their rates?
- 14. Is the fee schedule correct in relation to boat shed licenses?
- 15. Can Council please keep the Men's Shed in mind for opportunities for funding or support as they are often at capacity for helping the many calls they receive.
- 16. Can the Kingston Men's Sheds be made accessible, including ensuring all users can access the equipment?
- 17. Can the CEO please engage with a represented start-up to discuss an opportunity to work through recycling processing?

A webinar was held on 29 May 2019 to replicate the Public Information Session of 15 May. The General Manager Corporate Services presented the same information and participants were invited to ask questions. The webinar had 25 registrations and 12 people logged into the live session.

1.	Vicky Pisa			
	Ms Pisa has advocated for more services and facilities for older aged youth within the community and particularly referenced skate parks and libraries.			
	Officer Comment			
	Council is investing in the Masonic Lodge for a Youth Services Hub in Mordialloc which is accessible on public transport and open in mid-2020 at a cost of \$1.5m. There is also substantial expenditure on youth services (\$1.5m) committed in the draft budget.			
	Sir William Fry Reserve is a city youth space, with a large skate park for skaters and it is easily accessible from Mentone by train via the new Southland station.			
	Both neighbouring suburbs (Parkdale and Cheltenham) have large libraries with easy access from Mentone by public transport. With nine library branches across the municipality, Kingston has more libraries than any other Local Government in Victoria. Therefore, the establishment of a further branch in an area in such close proximity to existing branches would be difficult to justify. Council is considering other additional models such as temporary 'pop-up' library provision so Mentone could be

2. Michael Forbes, President Carrum Patterson Lakes Junior Football Club

The Club would like to have the sportsground lights upgraded to 150 Lux so night games can be held and also on oval 2 they wold like coaches' boxes installed.

Officer Comment

Council has completed plans for the upgrade of sports lighting on Oval No. 1 at Roy Dore Reserve. This upgrade is targeted for delivery prior to the 2020 winter season. The planned lighting level is a minimum 100 lux to meet club competition and match practice level of play, as defined in the AFL Preferred Facility Guidelines.

Other improvements such as coaches' boxes will be considered for future Council funding and/or investment from the allocation of the \$3.2M 2018 election commitment made to Roy Dore Reserve.

3. Wai Chan

Would like to see existing open space developed with facilities such as seating and/or playgrounds and specifically mentions Vanessa Court, Oakleigh South.

Officer Comment

Council officers are guided by the play space strategy and open space strategy to direct priority works.

Vanessa Court, Oakleigh South is not identified as a site for a play facility, but it is recognised that it needs to be improved with seating and landscaping for community enjoyment. It is a very bare site currently. Parks have a renewal budget for park improvements and Vanessa Reserve is included for design in 2019/20 financial year budget and implementation in 2020/21.

4. Marion Harriden, Chairperson, Dingley Neighbourhood House

Thanks Council for their ongoing support of what will be a great facility for Dingley Village Neighbourhood House with Stage 1 underway and are seeking information about Stage 2 works.

Officer Comment

This relates to stage 2 of the Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre. At this stage we do not have a budget provision for stage 2 which is estimated to cost in the order of \$4.5 - \$5 million.

Council is currently completing Stage 1 of the Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre at a cost of \$5m. Upon completion it is proposed to undertake an analysis of future needs, timing and costs to provide further advice to Council. Any such proposal would require a council report and resolution.

5. Kate, Resident

Do Council promote sustainability in the community in their own practices. Do they use sustainable resources?

Officer Comment

Council has a strong commitment to sustainability with the statement under Goal 2 of the Council Plan - "We will be responsible environmental managers and custodians for future generations."

We run a number of programs to assist the community to reduce their environmental impact. Details can be found here:

This website also details the action Council is taking to improve our environmental performance.

Most notably our Climate Change Strategy sets out clear goals for emissions reduction which flows through to our project management, operations, purchasing and staff behaviour.

Council has also recently joined a tender process to buy all its electricity from renewable sources.

Further examples are:

- the commitment to solar panels on Council buildings, with \$1m committed over the next 5 years.
- the recent conversion of local road street lights to LED globes at a cost of over \$3m;
 and
- a reduction of approximately 30 cars from our operational fleet over the last 4 years.

We regularly run articles outlining actions Council has taken, but most importantly information and inspiration for the community to also act.

6. Peter Ratcliff, Secretary Mordialloc & District Historical Society

This is a submission of the Historical Society for funding under the draft budget for essential works at The Old Bakery museum in Mentone.

The installation of a lift for access to the first floor is a pressing matter for both volunteers and visitors.

Officer Comment

The building continues to be a high priority for Council, given its heritage significance. The installation of a part 16 DDA compliant lift would be achievable for approximately \$200K. Current resource allocations are prioritised to other higher priority buildings.

Nonetheless Council officers will investigate detailed costings and statutory processes required to facilitate this request and a report will be prepared for consideration of Council.

7. | Paula Kyberd, President Chelsea Pony Club

I am writing to ask Council's assistance regarding some emergency dog proof fencing along the boundary of our club.

Recently we had a dog enter the paddock where the ponies were and seriously injured 2 of the ponies who required medical treatment.

There is some dog proof fencing around the property but not on the full perimeter so in some places its easy for a dog to enter the paddocks.

Could Council assist with making our existing fence safer from dogs so that we can coexist with people out walking their dogs enjoying the beautiful surrounding area.

Officer Comment

Council invites community groups to apply for grants to assist with funding for maintenance works. The City of Kingston Annual Grants Program provides an opportunity for the Council to work in partnership with the local community to enhance the quality of life of current and future generations of Kingston residents. Applications have closed for this year's grants but will open up early in 2020. Officers will work with the club to better define their requirements and report back to Council.

8. Emma Bryant, President Kingston Toy Library

1. The Toy library are very appreciative that the council makes available the toy library's hall (2B Lewis St Mordialloc) at very low rent, supports the organisation through promotion in council newsletters, and has awarded us several rounds of Community Grants. The toy library's operation also relies on more than 1200 hours of volunteer work per year from members, students and other volunteers, including the volunteer Toy Library Committee. Our staff and utility operating expenses aren't fully covered by membership fees, and we rely on grants to purchase new toys and equipment. We would like council to assist with the following:

- 2. Inclusion into the ages key stages pack handed out at MCH 12 months, 2 years and 3.5 years
- 3. Refurbishment and maintenance of the toy library building including more environmentally efficient heating, internal painting, improving the showroom flooring Incorporated Association A0049692H 2b Lewis Street Mordialloc 3195 (either wood stain or carpet), toilet floor replacing (aligning with Kingston City Council Draft Budget 2019/20 Goal 1);
- 4. \$21,000 to cover the cost of new shelving (aligning with Kingston City Council Draft Budget 2019/20 Goal 1); and
- 5. An annual contribution of \$12,575 to assist covering operating costs of the toy library. These ongoing operating expenses would be used to make the service available to a wider range of community members, including staffing extra regular open hours for families of children with sensory needs that find it very difficult to visit during the normal hours due to noise and increased activity when other members are present. (aligning with Kingston City Council Draft Budget 2019/20 Goal 3).

Officer Comment

The requested capital improvements will be considered as part of a larger project associated with the Alan McLean precinct in the medium term. In relation to the request for equipment and a contribution to cover annual operating costs this will require a Council report which will also consider the request for inclusion into the ages key stages pack.

Officer Comment

Council is focused on being sustainable in the long term whilst in a rate capping environment. Being sustainable is measured by generating enough cashflows to cover operating costs, to repay any debt, to invest in asset renewal to ensure our assets are well maintained and replaced . Any cash surpluses are used to fund current and future capital works programs. Kingston has planned for significant capital spend over the medium term.

17. Noble J David and Cheryl A David

We hope some funds are granted to the Arts in Kingston.

Please improve disability access at Westall Men's Shed.

It would be greatly appreciated if the Dog's Off leash area at Bald Hill Park could be fenced similar to the Bear St Mordialloc Park.

Officer Comment

The City of Kingston is committed to supporting the arts and invites individual artists, not-for-profit arts groups and organisations to make an application for an Arts Grant as part of the wider annual Community Grants Program. The Arts Grants program supports a diverse range of artists, arts practices and organisations. Arts projects must have a public outcome in Kingston.

Council officers will undertake a review of the facility layout and work with the Men's Shed Committee to identify future development needs for Council consideration.

The request for fencing the Bald Hill Park dog off leash area will be considered by officer in light of the fact that Bald Hill Park is a former landfill site.

The Historical Society proudly operates in this handsome and historic building. The building serves us extremely well and members are appreciative of Council's past willingness to significantly update it with security and comfort features and fittings.

A lift to reach the upper storey display area of the building has become a necessity as several of our few volunteers, as well as some of our visitors have great difficulty climbing the stairs, and people in wheelchairs are excluded completely. The ongoing ageing of volunteers and visitors alike will only exacerbate this problem.

Very frequent access to the first floor is required when our displays of photographs and artefacts are being changed, in fact the changing of displays has had to become less frequent than is desirable due to volunteers having difficulty with the stairs.


Society members are concerned also that we may be in breach of the Victorian Equal Opportunity Act, particularly Section 57 covering discrimination in access to public premises, such as Council-owned buildings.

We realise that fitting a lift into a historic building such as this will present some engineering and heritage challenges, but we urge you to investigate this proposal as soon as possible, and to make funding available in this year's budget.



The Kingston Toy Library, situated in Mordialloc, is a community-based, not-for-profit organisation that provides affordable access to appropriate toys and equipment to assist in the educational development of pre-school children aged 0 to 7. Children learn many skills through play; maths, language, social and emotional skills. Our toys increase sensory exploration, physical activity, promote a healthy lifestyle, encourage family social interaction and raise awareness of sustainability for our members and their children. There are 228 member families, with a total of 370 children as part of these memberships.

Our strategic plan has been intentionally broadening the library's outreach to service more vulnerable families in the Kingston community. Our new initiatives include expanding our toy collection for special needs and Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) children, bilingual story time, providing volunteer work experience for students with intellectual impairments and international university students, and making the library available to new mothers' groups outside open hours.

We are very appreciative that the council makes available the toy library's hall (2B Lewis St Mordialloc) at very low rent, supports the organisation through promotion in council newsletters, and has awarded us several rounds of Community Grants. The toy library's operation also relies on more than 1200 hours of volunteer work per year from members, students and other volunteers, including the volunteer Toy Library Committee. Our staff and utility operating expenses aren't fully covered by membership fees, and we rely on grants to purchase new toys and equipment.

Demonstrating the valuable community service we provide, the toy library is growing each year. The existing showroom space is crowded and at full capacity. To service the current and future membership we need to renovate two rooms adjoining the hall, that are currently used for storage and toy cataloguing and repair, to open them up as a toy showroom. We also need an estimated \$21,000 towards new shelving in those rooms that can safely store the toys for members and to replace ageing shelving throughout the existing showroom. These costs are not covered by membership fees and are typically also not funded through grants.

In this context, we ask that the council further consider supporting the toy library community and membership by:

- Inclusion into the ages key stages pack handed out at MCH 12 months, 2 years and 3.5 years
- Refurbishment and maintenance of the toy library building including more environmentally efficient heating, internal painting, improving the showroom flooring

Council Plan Goals

Goal 1 ... Our well planned, liveable city to ensure supported by infrastructure to meet future needs.

Request: Council to invest \$100,000? to create the position of a Conservation Planner

- to ensure the values of the Biodiversity Strategy 2018-23 are incorporated into planning decisions for new residential multi-builds eg: sustainable builds that enhanse POS and ease of access
- to address applications that involve historic properties

- to address applications with significant trees on site

- to address applications with native / remnant vegetation ansite

- to look at instigating ESO's on golf courses, green wedge, and the urban area.

Goal 2 ... Our sustainable green environment with accessable open spaces.

Request: - Council to create public open space in the acknowledged depleted area on the Edithvale / Chelsea border.

- Council implement a Trees on Private Property Policy to help protect what remaining large campy trees we have left, and to support the goal of a 30% campy cover.

- Tree Data Base. For the last 6 or 7 years I have continually read that Council maintains 90,000 trees, therefore stating no net increase.
- Council to provide a street tree species list.
 Residents are then able to gain an appreciation of what species are chosen, why and where. An educated resident is then more likely to "adopt their street tree".
- Council to increase funding For nature strip tree planting. It is stated in the Draft Budget, Council will plant 2149 street and park trees. Is this a marked increase from previous years? No. Council to increase resources to undertake and implement an increase in street tree planting.

Goal 3 ... Our connected, inclusive, healthy and learning community

Request: - Council to provide a minimum \$62,000 per year for the next 2 years to implement the Gardens for Wildlife program, and support the following initiatives:

- invest in Free booklets and brochures to help our community

care for the environment.

- produce a Sustainable Gardening booklet

- produce an Indigenous Flora Species brochure to replace the cutolated and incorrectly categorised "City of Kingston Indigenous Plant List for Landscaping".

- produce a Natural Reserves within Kingston booklet

- develop and for circulate information / fact sheets / website with regard to the understanding of biodiversity and it's value and why preserve it , and the appreciation of notive/ indigenous vegetation in landscaping.

- promote environmental friends groups more effectively online through an Environmental News Letter released approximately

every 2 months

- implement the Citizen Science program.

The City of Kingston Biodiversity Strategy 2018-23 page 4 states:-



"We aim to increase our residents awareness, appreciation and understanding of biodiversity, and encourage them to actively participate in managing biodiversity in their local community"

"Everyone has a role to play when it comes to protecting our precious environment."

Caroline,

I would like to comment on the draft budget that has been published on the Your Kingston Your Say.

It would appear that there is going to be a surplus of \$27m for the next year, and \$21m for this year. The following years also have similar surpluses forecast.

From the quarterly report from that last council agenda, it appears that the surplus that was budgeted for this year is \$9m ahead of budget. The rate revenue is \$2.5m ahead of budget.

From the quarterly financial statements - the accumulated surplus is \$41m ahead of budget, at \$1.425b

The quarterly report indicates that we have \$154m in cash investments.

Is this correct, or am I missing something.

The proposed budget appears to account for all works in the following year, and carries over money from the previous year for projects not yet complete.

If this is correct, why do we need to have any rate increase - we probably should be having a rate decrease - as we seem to be in a highly rated area compared to other councils.

I disagree with the idea that the rating structure is based on "rating values, which reflect capacity to pay" - does this mean you should sell your property when retired and cannot afford to live in the area - even though you have lived all your life in the area?

My husband and I attended the draft budget session. We congratulate Council on most importantly ensuring Kingston City is financially viable and for Council's ranking in 3rd place. Further we are pleased with the budget overall and the services provided by Council, the beautification of Kingston via its parks, beaches etc and congratulate Council and Kingston's employees for their competency and customer service.

It is heartening to see that Council has increased the Community Grants funding by \$100,000.00. This is very much appreciated when Council could have decided to maintain the funding at the last financial year's amount. So while it is a small increase it is an increase for which we commend Council. We hope that a reasonable amount of these funds will be granted to the Arts in Kingston, as we would like to see Kingston progressively recognized as a leader in this area.

Additionally we hope that Council can assist the Kingston's Men Shed located at Keeley Park, Westall. This Shed is the closest one to our home but my husband, who would like to be a member of Westall and who is confined to a motorised wheelchair cannot utilise this club due to safety reasons. I am sure Brad James of Kingston's Men Shed has made a submission requesting Council funding to address this and other problems the Shed is experiencing.

Lastly but significantly, is the need for more totally fenced dog parks. The Bear & Crown Streets Park in Mordialloc is greatly appreciated by Kingston's dog lovers, as is the Mentone Dog's Beach and other off leash dog parks. It would be greatly appreciated if the Dog's Off leash area at Bald Hill Park could be fenced similar to the Bear St Mordialloc Park. There seems to be an increasing number of noisy drones being flown in the parks which stresses the dogs.
